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CANTOR'S CORNER



FROM THE CANTOR'S VOICE, BY SOLOMON GISSER Cantor Debi Zeiontz

must retell the stories of the Nazis who very nearly murdered Jewish existence and Jewish prayer. Without our prayer, who are we as Jews? The Nazis tried to silence God. Solomon Gisser was a cantor who survived the Holocaust and wrote The Cantor's Voice, to count his story among other survivors' memoirs. Cantor Gisser was moved from ghettos to camps during the Holocaust. At Belitz, the only happy event was the Megillah reading at Purim. Solomon Gisser had a photographic memory and at 12 had gone to an elderly woman's home to recite the Megillah for her. Every other moment at Belitz was agony and hardship. As a prisoner in an agricultural camp, Hazzan Gisser was ordered by a German Kapo to sing for him when he was in a bad mood. He sang a Yiddish tune that utilized the Kol Nidre melody. The overseer broke down in tears and gave him food.

Meanwhile, other inmates were executed for stealing rotten soup, and dying from eating poisonous mushrooms. He and his brother Mayer were transferred to Birkenau, the worst death camp. They were thrown into a gas oven and made to lie face down in rows. A man in their row lifted his head and was beaten to death in the moment. They were stripped of possessions and dignity and told they'd be murdered within

27 Nisan, 5775 - April 16, 2015 - Yom Hashoah. We a few days. They were abused by Jews who'd been given the opportunity to live if they became beaters and killers of their own kind. They were given the opportunity to "die of less pain" by running into the electrocuting fence. Mayer pleaded to do this, but Solomon prayed and prayed, and within a day instead they were moved to Auschwitz, to work. They were tattooed with numbers and separated. Gisser's life was saved at Auschwitz by his voice. Upon stating his profession, his duty was to sing to the Kapo's overseeing the Jews working. The Gisser brothers participated in the Death March from Auschwitz (along with Elie Wiesel) on the night of January 18th, 1945, in the snow. Hundreds were shot on the walk. Nazis were burning evidence. Jews were eating snow from each other's backs and were grateful for the water. Between that night and April's liberation there were trips to and from Buchenwald. There was chaos, total starvation, and, for Solomon Gisser, typhoid, pneumonia, and a month in the hospital before personal liberation. Would he be considered one of the lucky ones? He married, raised children, and spent 45 years as the Cantor of a congregation in Canada. Of his entire family - parents, nine siblings, their spouses and kids - only three brothers remained, along with himself. They are gone now, but we remem-

THE RABBI WRITES

"The priest shall dress in linen raiment, with linen breeches next to his body, and he shall take up the ashes to which the fire has reduced the burnt offering on the altar and place them beside the altar. He shall then take off his vestments and put on other vestments, and carry the ashes outside the camp to a pure place." (Leviticus 6:3-4)

There is a Chasidic tale about a small town in Europe with a monastery. And unfortunately, the monastery was failing. There were only six monks still living there, and the head monk knew that soon they would have to close. In the town there was a rabbi. The head monk decided to meet with the rabbi for some advice. "Our monastery is failing. What can we do?" said the monk. The rabbi answered, "I don't know how to help you. You are Catholic and I am Jewish. But I know one thing. One of the monks in your monastery is the Messiah."

The chief monk was awe struck. He went back and told the monks, "One of you is the Messiah." Suddenly everything changed. Who was the Messiah? No one knew, so everyone began to treat their fellow monks with great dignity. The word reached the community, and people began to visit the monastery – soon, everything turned around, and the monastery began to flourish.

If we assume that everyone we meet is secretly a great saint worthy of treatment with dignity, it changes the world. There is a Jewish legend that there are thirty-six absolutely righteous people in the world - the lamed-vavniks. They live hidden among us, and no one knows who they are. But these thirty-six people sustain the entire world. Imagine approaching everyone

we meet as one of the lamed-vavniks.

In the Torah we learn that the High Priest must take off his priestly clothes, put on ordinary clothing, and carry the ashes of the offerings out to a dump site. Imagine running into the High Priest in ordinary clothes carrying a bucket of ashes. We would probably think that he is the janitor cleaning up the Temple area. Perhaps we would not treat him with dignity. That is why Rashi, the great Biblical commentator, mentions that the High Priest needed particular encouragement to carry out this ritual.

This is the perfect time to think about people who hide their true selves. On Wednesday, March 4th at 6:00pm, we will read the book of Esther, which tells the story of the Jewish queen who saved her people from the wicked Haman. Through most of the story, Esther kept identity hidden. "Esther had not made known her people, for Mordecai had charged her that she should not tell it." (Esther 2:10) If Esther had publicly displayed her Jewishness, she would not have been brought into the king's household. She was a secret Jew. And yet, when she revealed her hidden self, she was able to save her people.

Purim may be the day set aside for hiding our true selves. But many people rarely show their true face to the world. We meet people all the time who seem so ordinary. But underneath the mask, they may be the next savior, the High Priest, a lamed-vavnek, or even the Messiah. How important it is for us to approach each person as if they are hiding a secret self, a self who will change the world!

rowing up in a secular Jewish family, our Passover celebrations were elaborate and delicious dinners at my grandparents' home. The apartment was small, and dinner was served in shifts, adults first, then children, at an aluminum picnic table festooned for the occasion with a pretty tablecloth. Imagine, then, the culture shock I felt when Ed took me to Grandma Fortgang's seder around the corner from Grandma and Grandpa Schwartz's in the Bronx; I had entered an alternate universe! The reading of the Maxwell House Haggadah was completely in Hebrew, and lasted well into the night. When dinner was finally served, I was given a piece gefilte fish that Grandma Fortgang had made herself (not from a jar?!). I looked down at my plate, and the eyes of the fish looked back at me. Ed's dad caught the look of shock on my face, and exchanged plates with me,

noting that he loved to suck the eyes out of fish, which he proceeded to do.

Since that time, Ed and I have held many seders at our home. They have always been filled with songs, stories and levity; they mirror the personalities of the host and hostess. Time has changed the family and friends who sit at our table, and we have modernized and updated our seder to make it relevant, fun and memorable for whoever shares it with us.

Livery family's holiday celebration will be unique, reflecting the heritage and personalities of the assembled group. Today, there are innumerable Haggadot available, ranging from the "classic" Maxwell House pamphlet (available at your local supermarket) to a ten-minute one accessible on the internet. The Festive Meal can vary from a traditional Eastern European dinner

Beginning in September, our ELC will be open from 8:00am to 4:00pm, Monday through Friday. Families will be able to choose an 8:00am or 9:00am arrival time. They will have several choices for pick-up times and can select from as few as two or as many as five days per week.

Please help us to spread the word that our ELC provides a quality, nurturing early childhood education with affordable and flexible schedules to meet the needs of today's families! Walk into the ELC on any day and you will find children drawing, writing, feeding the fish, honing communication skills through dramatic play

and experimenting with spatial relationships as they build. Students from ages 2 – 5 years are offered age-appropriate experiences that include the State of New Jersey Core Curriculum Standards, taught in the way young children learn – through exploring their curiosity with hands-on experiences in language arts, music and movement, cognitive skills, dramatic play, fine and gross motor activities, science and much more.

While you are telling people about the new era at our ELC, be sure to tell them about Summer Camp. Our Summer Camp is especially designed for preschoolers from ages 2 – 6 years old (just before the kindergarten year). This year will feature more sprinklers, more outdoor learning and more exploring

nature. Summer Camp meets for six weeks starting on July 7th on Tuesday, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 10:00am – 2:00pm.

Younger children (up to 30 months) can be enrolled in our Summer Campers & Caregivers class. The children (and their adult) will enjoy sprinkler time and outdoor fun. Campers & Caregivers may choose to enroll from 10:30am – Noon on Tuesdays and/or Thursdays for six weeks starting on July 7th.

The Sunday morning before Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, I attended the joint worship service at New Light Baptist Church. If you have never attended, it is an experience not to be missed! At one point Pastor Armstrong said, "The only time we should look down on someone is when we are offering him a hand up." The Pastor reflected our focus as reform Jews to do tikkun olam, repair the world. In Sisterhood, we seek to uplift each other, our community and our world.

For example, we bake at Purim. But why? Baking is something that appears simple, but has meaning on many different levels. We bake to fulfill the mitzvah of hiddur mitzvah, making the celebration of the holiday more beautiful; to provide another generation the joy of making hamentashen for the holiday (I'dor v'dor) and to ensure that seniors have the opportunity to celebrate the holiday when we send mishloach manot, food platters to area assisted living centers. OUR URJ'S RELIGIOUS ACTION CENTER CHANGES LEADERS

Boston Rabbi Jonah Pesner, a 46-year-old marathon-running community activist, takes over from Rabbi David Saperstein, a respected dean of Washington faith advocates and law professor. Sapirstein was recently confirmed as the State Department's first non-Christian ambassador-at-large for international religious freedom.

As head of the RAC, Saperstein has been a member of probably every major liberal policy coalition since the early 1970s. Being director of the center may be the closest thing to being American Jews' lobbyist on mostly non-Israel issues, including health care, prison reform, marriage equality and reproductive freedom.

Pesner, a father of four girls, who considered running for John F. Kerry's former Senate seat in 2013, is seen as a phenomenon in the 1.5 million-member Reform Judaism movement. He pioneered the training of hundreds of congregations in Saul Alinsky-like community organizing techniques, wanting to transform synagogues from somewhat distant programming centers where parents drop children off for Hebrew school into intimate communities.

But Pesner's work in the District won't be easy. The landscape for faith advocates has transformed dramatically since Saperstein came to Washington in 1974. Religious denominations have lost huge influence in American life, while the number and range of religious and nonreligious advocacy groups setting up shop in Washington has exploded. And in a deeply polarized landscape, Americans are more wary than ever about the mix of religion and politics.

But Reform leaders — including Saperstein — hope a rabbi who led the coalition for mandatory health care in Massachusetts can more closely link Reform Jews' passion for liberal politics with their faith.

Pesner isn't expected to significantly shift the Religious Action Center's broad portfolio of topics, but he said that this year, a top issue must be racial and economic disparities. "Our folks want to be part of the solution. And they want the Reform movement to stand for that justice. They want to see America take on the racial and economic disparities and for us to be a leader, as we were in the civil rights era and at other times."

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

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
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
