Temple Shalom Religious School is a vibrant experience this year, filled with the joys of learning and the sounds of Jewish music. In October, we worked with Jewish educator/artist, Jennifer Levine, to create this beautiful mural for our Religious School Hallway:



This mural is reflective of the prayers Ahavat Olam and Ahavah Rabba – two prayers that are recited before the Shema. As Jews, we believe firmly in God's eternal and great love for the people Israel. The former is recited during the evening service and the latter during the morning service. Both prayers are not only proclamations of God's abundant and everlasting love for Israel, but also reminds us of our loving bond between God and the Jewish people. Take a moment to look over the mural and ask your child where their part is in it.

We are fortunate to offer informal educational experiences that allow us to learn while experiencing the benefits of exploring outside the classroom. In January, our 6th & 7th graders, along with their parents, will journey to Philadelphia, to the National Museum of American Jewish History, to explore and learn about our ancestors becoming American and Jewish Immigration since the Civil War. We will then venture to the Reading Terminal Market for a late lunch of international culinary choices.

n February, I will take our Confirmation class to Washington, DC for their Social Justice program at the Religious Action Center L'Taken program.

In March, our Post-Confirmation students and I will journey to Baltimore for a weekend of study, social justice and fun!

THE RABBI WRITES

On Sunday, December 22nd at nightfall, we will celebrate the Festival of Lights, or Chanukah. The eight-day Jewish celebration, known as Hanukkah or Chanukah, commemorates the rededication during the second century B.C.E. of the Second Temple in Jerusalem, where, according to legend, Jews had risen up against their Greek-Syrian oppressors in the Maccabean Revolt. It also celebrates a miracle that happened during this time, where just a day's supply of oil allowed the menorah in the rededicated Temple in Jerusalem to remain lit for eight days.

or many of us, this Chanukah will be a particularly charged time of reflection. The festival of lights is often celebrated by contemporary American families as a child-centric seasonal holiday. In modern times, it's often been framed in popular media as Judaism's answer to Christmas. But in the wake of rising anti-Semitism since last year's shooting at the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh (and the shooting in Poway as well), the holiday's message and meaning are taking on a more defiant turn.

In an America where anti-Semitic incidents are at an all time high, according to all authorities, Chanukah has become a more loaded holiday. A time of year that has become synonymous with family and now is becoming a time to reflect on what it means to be Jewish. Chanukah's meaning as a holiday about Jewish survival in a diverse religious landscape is more vital in 2019 America than ever.

As many have shared, Chanukah this year is as much about resilience and identity as about presents and miracle stories. Chanukah began as a relatively minor holiday in the Jewish tradition. Chanukah only became a major holiday in the 19th and 20th centuries, primarily among American Jews, many of whom actively sought to find within the Jewish tradition an analogue to more popular "mainstream" holidays like Christmas. In part because it's primarily celebrated at home, rather than in a synagogue, it's become more associated with spending time with family, or with selecting presents for children, than with its original historical significance. Now, many of us are sharing that Chanukah's original message - a celebration of Jewish resilience and Jewish identity in a troubled time - is all the more important.

Always remember that the Chanukah story is simply about a minority group that was different than the majority in the dominant culture. And the dominant majority culture said, 'We'd like you to fit in better or go away.' And the Jews said, 'No, that's not how we roll." In other words, Chanukah is about both Jewish survival and Jewish individuality: a celebration of Jews' refusal to surrender their identity and values.

Come join us with your chanukiah (Chanukah Menorah) and candles on Friday, December 27 at 7:00pm so we can together fight back against the darkness, both literally and metaphorically. Let's come together and bring some light into the darkness and bring some love and some joy into otherwise bleak times.

Social Action Committee

Depending on the data source, food insecurity affects anywhere from 10–14% of households in New Jersey. The USDA estimated that nearly 866,000 people - almost one-third of them children - were food insecure in our state in 2017, and more than 118,000 of them lived in Monmouth and Middlesex counties. The Social Action committee (and the greater Temple Shalom community at large) attempt to help decrease these numbers through programs like the High Holidays Food Drive, Backpack Buddies and our Gan Tikvah garden.

It is the garden - our Garden of Hope - that I'd like to address here. The garden was begun about eight years ago in partnership with Temple Beth Ahm, and over the years has relied on help from members of both temples, along with Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and others in the community. Fresh vegetables and herbs are grown from May through October, and we donate them to the Matawan Methodist Church's food pantry. Those who rely on the pantry are thrilled to receive Jersey-fresh produce, and the cucumbers, tomatoes, okra, kale, collard greens, basil and more provide healthy alternatives to the typical food pantry fare.

Infortunately, the garden has had some issues in the last year or two, and the result has been a decrease in crop yield. As we address soil and pest problems, it's dawned on us that the biggest culprit is likely the shade from the trees between the garden and Church Street. As the trees have grown, the garden simply doesn't get the necessary amount of daily sunlight that healthy, strong plants need to grow. We're currently exploring alternative locations for a potential second garden and the possibility of having the trees trimmed. In the meantime, I invite you to share with us any other suggestions you may have to ensure that this vital community endeavor continues.

BOARD REPORT

At recent Board of Trustees meetings the following are a few of the agenda points discussed:

- Parking Lot Repair The repair of the parking lot was completed prior to the High Holidays. The repairs eliminated the potholes/sinkholes. The Board considered bids from three contractors before approving contractor M.J. Murphy to do the work.
- Security We have learned that Federal and State grant funding applications for Security were denied for this year. This was not totally unexpected, as the Temple received funding last year (and other applicants did not). The Board is now considering implementing a monthly Security special assessment. The overall cost would be based on when we would want a Security Guard present at the Temple. If the Board ultimately approves a special assessment, this would require further congregational approval at a special meeting.
- Steve Slome has discussed the need to fill a few Committee Chair roles for 2019-2020. The open positions are Facilities, the Board of Education and Membership Engagement. If you have an interest in filling one of these roles (or doing it jointly with another person), please contact Steve. Please note that the time commitment (with the support of the PAC and the Board of Trustees) is not as cumbersome as you may think. Your help would be greatly appreciated.

On Friday November 15th, 52 teens from the NFTY-GER (Greater Empire Region) arrived at Temple Shalom for Fall Kallah: a weekend of religious, educational and social action programming. Over the course of the next two days, the teens led Friday night and Saturday morning Shabbat services, learned about Urban Mitzvah Corps and the history of NFTY. Old friendships were renewed and new friendships were formed. The teens in attendance came from as far as Rockland County, Essex County and as near as Marlboro and Manalapan, as well as many places in between.

Fall Kallah marked the first time in three years that NFTY-GER has held a home hosted event. Families from Temple Shalom and Temple Rodeph Torah opened their homes to the participants for the weekend, not only housing them but also providing breakfast and dinner on Saturday and transportation between the host homes and Temple Shalom throughout the weekend.

What temple committees or projects have you been involved with?


Since becoming a member, I am involved with WTS and membership committee. I also like to participate in Torah studies led by Rabbi Malinger.

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




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


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
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
